Message Title / Pastor: The Empty Tomb - Pastor Bill Wilson

MESSAGE OVERVIEW

On Easter Sunday, the early Orthodox Church created a tradition that is followed even today. The Pastor would declare, “He is risen” and the congregation would respond, “He is risen indeed.” This tradition became a common greeting for believers when they would see other believers on the street. In the message on Easter, we considered John’s narrative that tells us that Mary Magdalene ran from the empty tomb to tell Peter and John that the tomb was empty. Both men then ran to the place where Jesus had been buried to check for themselves. What they discovered changed their lives forever.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What is your “I ran out of gas in my car” story?
2. What stands out to you from Matthew's account of the resurrection found in Matthew 28:5-7?

3. Why do you think Peter and John ran to the tomb?
4. Pastor Bill in his message spoke about the empty tomb providing gifts for us. One of those gifts was redemption. What does redemption mean to you? (I Peter 1:18-21)
5. How does the empty tomb give hope to an empty life?
6. When did you first grasp the true meaning of the resurrection?
7. How does the resurrection help you pray with confidence?

Father God, we humbly come before You. As we reflect on the most dramatic and meaningful declaration of love, we are overwhelmed by Your selfless sacrifice.
